Communication within a multilingual organisation

Servas uses English as the main language of communication although we are very much a multi-lingual organisation with a rich diversity of languages. During formal meetings such as the SI General Assembly, as well as at less formal gatherings, language can present a barrier to good communication.

At international meetings there are always concerns that delegates may be unable to participate on an equal basis with each other because of the reliance on English as the lead language. Those with a more limited knowledge of English may find it difficult to join in group discussions and so make a full contribution.

Clearly Servas does not have the means to access expensive interpreting services or equipment. Simultaneous translation into Spanish projected onto a large screen has been successful at a number of General Assemblies. I am also interested in exploring ways of improving interpretation and understanding of the proceedings for those from a range of other languages.

Malawi: SYLE volunteers, a new venture

In March, Demelza, national secretary in Malawi, sent a message about Servas volunteers coming to Malawi. We look forward to hearing how things went in the next bulletin. Anyone interested in trying the same idea, contact Demelza at <u>demelzabenbow@gmail.com</u>

Malawi's first SYLE-volunteer is due to arrive on 7th April in Blantyre.

In an attempt to encourage more Servas travellers to Malawi, Servas Malawi has created a volunteer version of the youth SYLE language programme. In our project, a Servas Traveller comes and spends the first 2 weeks with 7 hosts explaining to them hosting and travelling with Servas and giving a presentation about their country. They then spend 1-2 weeks with longer stay hosts and carry out voluntary work on each day of the stay. Our first SYLE-volunteer is due to arrive in a few days and she will be working with the Blantrye blood donation centre, collecting much needed testimonies from blood receivers. Our next volunteer comes from Australia in May and will be working in rural areas, creating a practical language programme followed by 2 weeks teaching at our local prison.

News from Servas Brazil

Alvany Santiago, retired National Secretary sends news from Servas Brazil.

- Servas Brazil organized a Regional National Meeting in April. This meant that countrywide, all regions met at the same time and some connected with each other by skype or mobile. Is this an idea that could work in other countries where distances between regions are large?
- In Petrolina, PE in the northeast of Brazil we have decided to organize a SYLE program (Servas Youth Language Experience) and receive a young person here later in 2013. My students between 20 and 25 are keen to be involved. Some of them are already in Servas, some belong to our Youth Servas & Peace group that encourages young people to get involved.
- We have also started a campaign 'Women and Men Joined for Peace!'

We launched it on Women's International Day and will highlight it again on **International Peace Day** on **September 21st 2103**. One of the actions of this campaign is to talk with workers about relationships and conflict during Accident Prevention Week that most organisations launch every year.

Message from the Servas International Archivist:

I am the new SI Archivist, and I am asking for your help. I need to develop a policy regarding what documents and items should belong in the SI archive, which physically now resides at the Hoover Institution, on the campus of Stanford University in California.

There are 105 boxes in storage, but no materials are on-line. Ultimately I would like to see historically important documents readable on-line. First, however, the collection needs to be described and I will be working on that.

I would like your input on what documents you think we should value most by making them most widely available to all. What criteria should we use? Secondly, what should we acquire from individuals and Servas national organizations? Third, how to collect this material (where to send it, who pays for the cost of shipping, etc.)? Perhaps we should also discuss whether we need to keep actual paper copies of documents or instead simply have a digital archive on the SI server.
